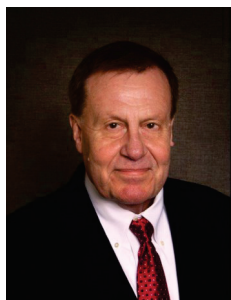

CEO REPORT By Leo Barlow

Dear Shareholders of Tyonek Native Corporation;

In the winter edition of Tebughna Henek you were informed of several management changes that have been made by the Board of Directors. As your new CEO I want to take this opportunity to make you aware of several changes that have occurred since the beginning of the New Year that are designed to return TNC to profitability.

As we witnessed in 2016, the combination of reduced government contracting operations, the lack of construction opportunities in the lower 48 coupled with the decline in oil and gas operations in the Cook Inlet all contributed to a net loss for TNC. To address this situation the Board of Directors adopted a Turnaround Plan designed to recalibrate the operations of the Company. The plan will focus on concentrating on our core businesses in manufacturing and services and divesting of operations that were not profitable. The turnaround plan also includes the consolidation of several Alaska based entities directly into the parent Company- TNC.

Specific actions that have been taken to return the company to profitability include:

- Cutting the Board budget
- Limiting Board travel
- Cut out Board meeting costs
- Suspended all bonuses, company wide
- Suspended all dividends at the request of our Bank
- Cut several million dollars out of corporate overhead by reducing staff and eliminating 127 positions companywide
- Divesting of construction activity in the lower 48 that lost several million dollars over the last 5 years at the request of the bank
- Establishing a program to rebuild sales and profits for manufacturing and services operations

The actions taken now along with increased sales activity in our government contracting businesses project that the company will see a

slight profit in 2017, but that being said, it will not be until 2018 that the company returns to adequate profitability to restore the dividend.

Currently since the beginning of the New Year and the change out in management TNC's operating subsidiaries in manufacturing and services have been awarded substantial new contracts and have responded to at least 20 new contract solicitations.

All of our initiatives are guided by a single focus of increasing Shareholder Value. To accomplish this we need to work together as a team and that team consists of Shareholders, Board Members and Management staff that are working on stabilizing the Company, focusing on our core competencies, streamlining, and right-sizing TNC and its operating subsidiaries.

Change is never easy, but necessary changes are being made for the future good of Tyonek Native Corporation. As part of this process I am pleased to announce that Connie Downing, our current President of Tyonek Alaska Group is being promoted to the position of Chief Administrative Officer. Connie is an outstanding Shareholder employee of TNC and is well suited for this new task where she will oversee, companywide, all aspects of TNC's administrative processes and re-engineer them to provide better management controls and policies to make TNC more efficient and driven toward profitability. A biosketch of Connie is contained in this newsletter.

I would like to take a moment to acknowledge a special person in TNC's business history. Donald Standifer retired at the end of December 2016, from his position as President of Tyonek Contractor's. Throughout his long history in the construction business and during his tenure with TNC Don worked tirelessly to provide training and employment opportunities for TNC shareholders and others. He pioneered a lot of our engagement with the oil and gas industry on the west side of Cook Inlet as well as in our construction endeavors in the lower 48 and other parts of Alaska. We will miss Don and his wise counsel, but I

know that all we have to do is pick up the phone and Don will continue to provide and share his knowledge. We wish Don well in his retirement, but I doubt he will sit idle as he turns to a new chapter in his life.

This past week we learned of injuries sustained by our VP Finance, Steve Gair, as a result of a bicycling accident. Steve has undergone surgery and is on the mend. We all wish him a speedy recovery and in the meantime are

staying in close contact with Ryan Kutche, our Sr. Corporate Accountant who has stepped up to be the point of contact for our Finance Department.

TNC is moving to secure new banking relationships as currently we have only one major bank in our portfolio. It is never good business practice to operate with just one bank so we have been in communication with several banks, all of whom are impressed with our balance sheet, and have indicated we will be getting proposed term sheets from them. Having several banks in our portfolio will gain us better pricing and allows for banks to participate together to achieve significantly larger lines of credit than we currently have.

Looking forward, the company has taken several steps as outlined above and is focused on building profitability and stability so that we may better serve our shareholders for many generations to come. The situation we find ourselves in shall pass to a far brighter future with the hard work of our shareholders, Board and management all engaged and focused on a common goal—building Shareholder Value.

In closing I would like to reiterate that TNC has an open door policy and should any of you desire more information or simply want to talk please do not hesitate to pick up the phone or send a message.

I am very honored to be part of the Tyonek Family and look forward to meeting many more shareholders along the way.

We will update shareholders at a meeting in Tyonek on March 25. Weather has been a factor in scheduling. The Anchorage Shareholder meeting on February 25th was well attended. Leo Barlow presented an update on company operations and coming events. A Question and Answer session with Staff and the Board lasted well over an hour. We look forward to meeting with shareholders in Tyonek and discussing the status of the company and shareholder concerns.



Leadership

You all know our new CEO Leo Barlow, but we now have a second in command in the Anchorage Office. Connie Downing has been promoted to the Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) position. Connie keeps the company running while Leo travels and manages all back office functions. They work well together. Congratulations Connie!

Native Village of Tyonek

We have been working closely with NVT and tribal council leadership on the Kaloa Buildings and community issues. TNC financed a feasibility study for operating and financing the Kaloa Buildings. Based on the findings from that study, the Village recently voted to put the buildings up for sale. TNC management has been working with Art and the council to help in this matter and extend credit to cover some costs. We look forward to working with the Village on a number of land issues that will be addressed by an ongoing land planning effort.

Tebughna Foundation recently acquired a grant to develop a master land plan for the Native Village of Tyonek in cooperation with the community. This plan will build a foundation for community planning, verifying current village land uses and laying out a road map for future growth. Planning meetings are scheduled in Tyonek. Everyone should help as much as possible. This plan will help us identify and resolve land reconveyance options in Tyonek.

New Alaska Construction Company

Even though oil and gas activities have slowed on the West Side, we are preparing for future work. The Board approved the organization of Tyonek Contractor Services, LLC at our February meeting. This new company will seek work in Alaska and in Tyonek that we expect to see in the coming years. We hope to work closely with the Village and use our joint capabilities to carry out projects near

the Village.

Nikiski Boundary Commission Petition

TNC and NVT filed a joint opposition to a Nikiski petition to the Local Boundary Commission seeking approval for a new city encompassing land around Nikiski, Tyonek, and Beluga. Nikiski's main claim is that our fire service district and oil and gas fields create a community. Our petition points out that we have little in common and that the new city would not increase or improve services that Tyonek already receives from the Borough. Indeed with the population and control of the proposed city concentrated on the east side in the Nikiski community, Tyonek would have even less influence than it does now. The petition points out that NVT and TNC own all lands in our community and that very few, if any, proposed city services would extend to our lands. Finally, we show that our community has very little in common with Nikiski, very few contacts, and that Tyonek community lifestyles focus on subsistence and local culture, not industry.

TYONEK ALASKA GROUP, INC (TAGI) By Connie Downing

At their February meeting, the TNC Board of Directors approved the dissolution of Tyonek Alaska Group, Inc. (TAGI) and the transfer of its subsidiaries directly to TNC. This move is an effort to cut costs and consolidate Alaska operations. TAGI is responsible for the management of TNC's Land, North Foreland Barge (Barge landing), Tebughna Preserve (Lodge), and Tyonek Health Care Service (THCS – inactive). Other

areas TAGI staff have been working are the Tyonek Village operations of the construction group and Alaska Glass & Door. A new construction company was approved for Alaska to separate it from its Lower 48 operations. Work has begun to create Tyonek Contractor Services, LLC (TCS) as the construction company in Alaska. Alaska Glass & Door has also moved directly under TNC. Services of the Land department and the various

companies will not be disrupted during these transitions.

The Lodge has been marketed to various agencies to seek an operator to lease the property. As of yet our marketing efforts have not proved fruitful, we are seeking the assistance of a licensed Realtor to list as a business opportunity to expand visibility of this property.

Native Village of Tyonek

2016 has seen numerous challenges in the lands department as oil and gas activities continue to decline on TNC lands. Aurora Gas one of our longest surface use permittees is currently going through bankruptcy and the future of the gas developer remains in question. Although Aurora Gas's fiscal challenges significantly impact TNC's Alaska operations, TNC still has opportunities to fill at least some of the void left by our long time land user.

Finite Carbon, a company specializing in the development of Carbon Offset Projects, approached TNC with an opportunity to sell carbon offsets within the California market. California passed a bill in 2006 to reduce greenhouse gases by sequestering landholdings to offset carbon emissions produced by the numerous large businesses like BP or Coca Cola. In 2015 the California Air Resources Board included some Alaska land as eligible in their program. Three areas of TNC land under consideration for the project are Moquawkie (Tyonek area), Tuxedni, and Kenai National Wildlife Land. TNC has passed the initial feasibility phase stating we have a viable project. We are one of a handful of Native Corporations in Alaska looking into

this great opportunity that has become available.

The community of Nikiski has filed a petition with the Alaska Department of Commerce, Local Boundary Commission to incorporate Nikiski as a Home Rule City. In the petition the community of Nikiski has included some 73,000 acres of TNC land to be included in this incorporation. This includes the Village of Tyonek and the community of Beluga. TNC has invested significant time and resources reviewing the petition and has determined that the community of Nikiski cannot serve the best interests of TNC or the Native Village of Tyonek. To that affect TNC has joined forces with the Native Village of Tyonek (NVT) to oppose Nikiski's incorporation as a Home Rule City.

The Alaska Board of Fisheries (ABF) met earlier this month on various issues related to the fishing industry in the region. The Alaska Department of Fish and Game has filed a recommendation to the ABF to keep the Chuitna River closed to Chuitna kings. TNC and NVT have submitted a joint letter that was delivered during the ABF proceedings supporting this decision by the agency to keep the river closed. King salmon has always been a significant cultural and subsistence resource for the Village of Tyonek. TNC along with NVT believes that although the presence of Chuitna River Kings has risen over the past few years the numbers are not yet sustainable to substantiate opening the Chuitna River for King salmon fishing.

TNC's 14(C) application period has come to a close with one remaining applicant still in the process of being negotiated. With no applicants remaining in the five regions of south central Alaska where TNC has landholdings TNC has only to settle with the remaining applicant to finally bring our 14(c) obligation to a close and lift a cloud on all TNC landholdings.

With the start of 2017 TNC has made numerous changes to our land access policies and procedures. For shareholders of TNC and community members of Tyonek no access permit is needed for TNC lands around the Village of Tyonek for access, personal, or recreational use of TNC lands. Commercial guiding businesses will still need a permit to operate on TNC lands. The purpose of TNC's permitting program is to not only protect TNC and its assets but to protect the users of TNC lands as well ensuring that the land user has the necessary protections to operate their business activity in a safe and effective manner. TYONEK MANUFACTURING GROUP (TMG) By Steve Adlich

We are off to a great start in 2017. We've had numerous wins in our manufacturing group totaling well over \$30 million just in the last few weeks. Our services group recently won a \$9M contract to provide cyber training – you can read more about that in a separate article in this newsletter. We passed our annual AS9100 audit with flying colors and continue to see more and more activity on the business development front.

In January, our TMG location in Madison, Alabama implemented a 4-day, 10-hour shift schedule for hourly manufacturing employees. This has been received favorably by our team and allows us the additional “off” day to support surge overtime needs. Our mechanical manufacturing shop is currently running at full capacity.

Our new CEO, Leo Barlow, has added stability at the top level of our company and continues to provide leadership and support from Alaska for the manufacturing and services groups. He is currently leading an effort to focus more aggressively on our core strengths of manufacturing and services work.

While we have many new wins to celebrate, we still have work to do to ensure we are positioned for growth in the future. We continue to evaluate every aspect of our business to identify improvement areas and ways to make our bids more competitive. I have been working very closely with the site leads at each of our locations in order to achieve better integration and equity across all of our facilities.

We announced the addition of Dan Price to our team as Director of Strategy. He will lead strategic planning efforts for

TMG and TSG to set and achieve growth objectives and improve internal performance. His extensive proposal development and strategic communications experience will help to drive sales and customer engagement in support of the companies' business development and marketing teams.

Our HR group recently rolled out two new initiatives. We moved to our new training platform, SafetySkills in December. This platform gives each employee their own training portal where they can manage their training requirements. The training includes government, human resources, contract, safety and security requirements. SafetySkills also helps us to provide real-time reports on training status for any audit or reporting requirement we encounter.

In addition, as part of our continuous effort to give employees a better HR experience, we have migrated our customer support processes to Samanage Help Desk Ticketing System. The new system will help us streamline our processes and will provide better reporting data. Alicia Casteel and her team continue to do a great job in supporting our employees.

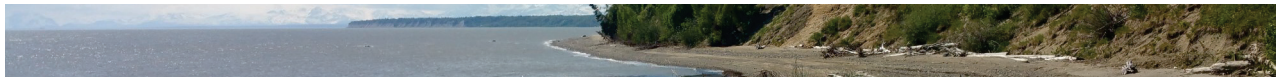
On the Services side, we completed a

Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) inspection of our Tyonek Services Overhaul Facility – Stennis with no major deficiencies. Completion of this inspection allows the FAA to reissue our Part 145 Repair Station Certificate. We also completed and submitted a detailed plan to add a 7-man PMI team to each one of our USMC AV-8B sites. These additional teams were requested by the USMC due to the fantastic work of Team Tyonek at our sites.

Doug Baker and our Business Development team are very busy pursuing new contracts. In the past few months, we have submitted more than \$60 million in contract bids and we feel very good about our win probability on many of those. We have great confidence that the strategic leadership of our executive team coupled with the outstanding work performed by our employees will lead to more wins in the future which will allow us to meet our core goal of increasing value for our shareholders, customers and employees.

Tyonek Awarded \$9M Air Force Space Command Contract

Tyonek Global Services, LLC, a subsidiary of Tyonek Services Group, Inc. (TSG) and Tyonek Native Corporation (TNC), has been awarded a contract by the Air Force Space Command to provide formal cyber operations training, course development, and essential capabilities for the 39th Information Operations Squadron (39 IOS). The 39th IOS is the U.S. Air Force's premier information operations and cyber training unit, preparing mission-ready operators for basic-level and advanced mission requirements at all Air Force major commands.

“We are excited for the opportunity to support the Air Force Space Command with our extensive expertise and experience in cyber training and course development,” said Steve Adlich, President, TSG. “Cyber is a critical battlespace for the future. This award positions Tyonek for continued expansion of our customer relationships on key cyber programs.”

As the Prime Contractor for this **\$9 Million** contract award, Tyonek and its subcontractor, Booz Allen Hamilton, will employ 50 new employees. Tyonek will provide instructors, course developers, student mission training systems administrators, network system administrators, and hardware/infrastructure maintenance services.

“This opportunity allows us to renew our focus on one of our strongest core competencies –cyber training,” said Doug Baker, Vice President of Business Development. “Tyonek Services Group has proven capabilities in this field and we look forward to providing our expertise to our customer.”

Tyonek employees, augmenting the current Government staff, will train between 1000 to 3000 students per year at Hurlburt Field, Florida and Joint Base San Antonio (JBSA), Texas.

While at Tyonek Village she worked for the Native Village of Tyonek in various positions and ended as the Tribal Administrator. She served as an elected member on the Tribal IRA Council and the TNC Board of Directors for a short time which helped her to better understand each entity. Connie obtained her Real Estate license in Alaska and was active in residential sales while attending Matsu College for her AA degree when she was hired on with TNC. Connie likes to learn, work with dedicated team members, and doesn't mind taking on a challenge. She cites her proudest moments with TNC as the development of a TNC Land Vision and Mission, closeout of various contaminated sites on TNC land, restarting the 14(c) process to bring it to conclusion, working with TTCD to enhance salmon stock, and working closely with the TNC Board of Directors and NVT Council on joint goals. These accomplishments have been carried out with the help of numerous dedicated TNC and subsidiary staff, and collaborations with other entities.



This autumn, TTCD continues to work with Tyonek Native Corporation and our other partners to conserve, enhance, and encourage the wise use of natural resources. The 2016 summer season featured many successful projects and we have a lot to celebrate, including our largest garden harvest, the completion of an invasive plant control project in Beluga, two successful pike derbies, a new fire break surrounding Tyonek, and several new projects at TTCD.

The Tyonek Garden flourished this year with warm weather and diligent caretakers. TTCD Garden Supervisor Gwen Chickalusion and Summer Youth Interns LEEANNE and Reka Smoke worked with other TTCD staff to grow a bounty of vegetables. This year, TTCD harvested over 2,000 lbs of produce, including potatoes, carrots, pumpkins, watermelon, zucchini, and more!

Through the Fish Passage & Habitat Program, TTCD continues to monitor watershed health in the District and works to address issues that impact watershed health. TTCD has begun coordinating logistics for the replacement of three culverts within the Indian Creek drainage to support healthy salmon populations. TTCD also continues to address invasive pike and invasive plants in the District. Thank you to all who participated in the September pike derby. Congratulations to Crystal Jones, who caught the largest pike at 91 cm long, and to Clarke Smith, who caught 19 pike, the most caught during the derby.

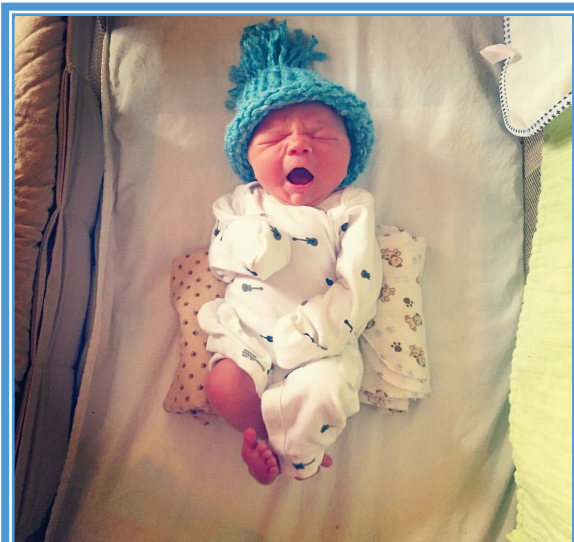

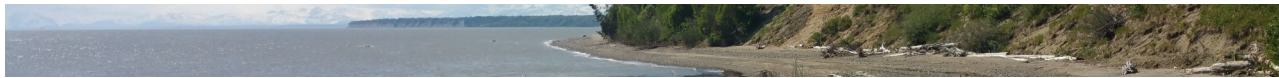


Proud parents Brittany Kroto & Brian Masuda of Tyonek are happy to announce the birth of their son, Mateo Teigan Ray Masuda.
